

Message from Rev Eric Lomax

Dear All.

Did you know that magpies are considered the most intelligent of non-mammals! They are one of the few creatures who can recognise themselves in a mirror, and also, they are known for stealing shiny things. Another fact about magpies is that when they mate, they mate for life, and for this reason, superstitious people believe it is bad luck to see one that is on its own; hence the popular nursery rhyme; 'One for sorrow, two for joy.....' Having worked in rural parishes in Lincolnshire, on several occasions, I encountered the very cruel 'Larsen traps,' that are put out by some farmers to catch magpies. One magpie is caught and placed in one of two connected cages. As it calls out, another magpie will come to support it, and is trapped in the other cage. One magpie is killed, and the other is left to call out again.

We are not solitary creatures. We need company, and being social animals, social distancing is hard for all of us. As Christians, we are facing enforced separation at Easter, for the first time since the plague. ...continued overleaf

Even during WW2, Christians were allowed to meet, to celebrate Easter, but now, it is forbidden.

This Sunday, we cannot meet to celebrate Jesus's triumphal entry in Jerusalem. We cannot hold up palm crosses, as the residents of Jerusalem welcomed Jesus with palms, in the first century. We cannot shout, together; 'Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord, Hosanna in the highest, and we cannot sing together; 'All glory, laud and hour,' as the church has for many years before. Like magpies, we are social animals, and this community celebration is a part of who we are.

The story of Palm Sunday is simple for those who have never heard it before. Jesus has spent his three-year ministry reaching out to communities on the edge of Jewish life, often straying into gentile territory, because God loves everyone, whoever they are, and whatever they have done.

At the end of this time he heads for the central city of the Jewish faith (please remember that Jesus was born a Jew, and was crucified as the king of the Jews), Jerusalem, and the community of that city welcomed him, as he rode through the gates, sitting on a donkey. The donkey was important, a Jewish leader called Judas Maccabeus, and later, his brother Simon, entered Jerusalem in the same way, to defeat an occupying force known as the Seleucids. This time, the Jewish people expected the same kind of ruler, who was going to liberate them from Roman Rule.

Jesus was not the leader or the King they expected. Instead he was a humble, loving, forgiving king, who lives as we live, suffers as we suffer, and dies as we die. He represents a God, who in Jesus, is in solidarity with us in our human experience.

There have been many points in history, when Christians have been forbidden to meet together for worship and prayer. Still, this happens in many parts of the world. In many

cases, Christians, stand bravely against this prohibition. This is because, like magpies, we belong together as a community of faith. We belong together to worship God. In Holy Week, we belong together to celebrate the coming King. We belong together to share the bread and wine, as Christ shared his body with us on Maundy Thursday. On Good Friday, we belong together at the foot of the cross, and finally to rise with the sun together, in celebration of the Resurrection, on Easter Sunday Morning.

This year we will not be together in the normal sense, and law requires that we do not meet. This year, however, in the name of Christ we will not be together. Staying apart is the most loving thing we can do because it protects ourselves and others from this virus. We should not resist the law, because like Christ is in solidarity with us, so we need to be in solidarity with those who are also alone at this time.

However difficult this may be in Holy week, we have faith that Christ still gives us food for our journey of faith, Christ still died for us, and Christ was still raised for us. Still there is the call that we invite Jesus to be King of our hearts.

Make your own (paper) Palm Cross

<u>Step 1</u>: Cut a strip of paper (the longer the better but a strip lengthways from a A4 piece of paper will make a small cross).

<u>Step 2</u>: Fold the strip in half to find the middle. Then bend the right end (B) straight up (diagonally) at the centre to form a right angle.

Step 3: Fold what is now the vertical strip (B) down behind the diagonal fold from step 2.

Step 4: Fold the vertical strip (B) forwards and up over at the front to make a 'square' at the back.


Step 5: Bring the left strip (A) forward and fold over the centre to the right.

<u>Step 6:</u> Fold the same strip (A) away from you and pull through inside the 'square' on the back (pull all the way through).

<u>Step 7</u>: Bend the top strip (B) forward and down, pulling through inside the centre 'square' to make the top part of the cross.

Step 8: Fold the left hand strip (A) backwards and through the 'square' to form the left part of the cross.

Step 9: Fold the right hand strip (A) forwards and tuck into the 'square' to complete the cross.



Use your Palm Cross as a bookmark to remind you of this 'extraordinary' Palm Sunday or perhaps put it in a front window of your house for other people to see. If you have children and access to coloured paper why not get them to make a rainbow of Palm Crosses for your front window.
