
A Reading for the Week

Romans 12.1-8

I appeal to you therefore, brothers and sisters, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect. For by the grace given to me I say to everyone among you not to think of yourself more highly than you ought to think, but to think with sober judgement, each according to the measure of faith that God has assigned. For as in one body we have many members, and not all the members have the same function, so we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another. We have gifts that differ according to the grace given to us: prophecy, in proportion to faith; ministry, in ministering; the teacher, in teaching; the exhorter, in exhortation; the giver, in generosity; the leader, in diligence; the compassionate, in cheerfulness.

Service at St James on Sunday 23rd

Services in our churches (or the churchyards if good weather) during August will be as follows:

Sunday 23rd August - 9.30am St James Sunday 30th August - 9.30am All Saints

<u>Please read the following important notes on</u> what to expect when attending Church

Face coverings must be worn by all those who attend (this is now a legal requirement) (if you are exempt please bring some evidence with you). We will have a few disposable face masks for use by anyone who has been unable to obtain one.

Please wash your hands before leaving home. You will be asked to sanitise your hands on entering and leaving the church.

A one-way system will operate in both the Church and the Churchyard. Please enter the churchyard via the entrance opposite the Church Barn. Entry to the church (if the service is inside) is by the main door. Please note the signs in place and follow the one way system once inside. You will be asked to exit via the Chancel door and the main Churchyard gates. Please adhere to social distancing requirements at all times when in the Church and Churchyard.

We are required to keep a register of attendees' names and contact numbers which can be used for the Track and Trace system if required. These details will be stored securely and disposed of after 21 days.


If you are in a vulnerable category we advise you not to attend these physical services, but this is ultimately your decision to make.

Message from Rev Eric Lomax

Last week we looked at the Canaanite woman, who approached Jesus out of desperation for the sake of her daughter. As a Gentile woman, an outsider, she believed herself to be outside the love of God but Jesus showed her otherwise. In order to receive his love, however, she had to reach out across the boundaries of prejudice, racism, and gender bias, the arrogance of religion, and this meant sacrificing her own dignity. She risked rejection in order to reach out to Jesus.

This week I move back to Paul's letter to the Romans. Here, Paul talks about us being saved not by following the strict observances of religion, but purely by the grace and the love of God. This does not, however, mean that we should do nothing and depend only on God. Paul makes us clear that there is a personal cost to following Jesus. We must present ourselves as a 'living sacrifice, holy, and acceptable to God.' (Romans 12:1)



Paul was writing to two types of people here.

Firstly, the Jewish readers would have been followers of a religion that practiced a complex system of sacrifices in order to stay close to God. They would have to slaughter a living thing in order to buy a relationship with God. Logic dictates that really this is no relationship at all, and the Christian teaching is that Jesus, instead, gave his life for us on the cross.

Secondly, the Greco-Roman readers would have had no knowledge of the Jewish ideas of sacrifice. Their understanding of the physical world was largely influenced by Plato which separated the world into its visible (physical, material) and invisible (spiritual) aspects. For the Greeks, the physical, material world was something to be endured until the soul could be freed of it.

Greek dualists could never have suggested offering our bodies to God as a living sacrifice, because such an offering would be inherently unworthy of God.

Paul was saying to his readers that God did not want animal sacrifices and while our bodies are, indeed, unworthy of God, our lives and our bodies are, indeed, what God requires of us. Like the Canaanite woman, in order to reach out to Jesus and grasp his love and his grace we must reach out and put our very selves on the line for him.

Paul knew very well what it meant to offer his own body as a living sacrifice. He wrote on many occasions about the personal cost of following Jesus. He wrote; 'For it seems to me that God has put us apostles on display at the end of the procession, like those condemned to die in the arena. We have been made a spectacle to the whole universe, to angels as well as to human beings.' (1 Corinthians 4:9). Read the whole passage if you get chance. Paul makes it clear, however, the immense benefits of paying the price of discipleship. By giving yourself to him you discover what he calls the 'Glorious freedom of the children of God.' (Romans 8:21), and you begin to discover 'as all God's people should, how wide, how long, how high, and how deep his love is.' (Ephesians 3:18)

Gospel Reading

Matthew 16.13-20

When people heard the stories about Jesus, they couldn't believe that he was just an ordinary man. They thought he was a prophet like their Old Testament heroes.

Arriving in Caesarea Philippi, Jesus asked his disciples, 'Who do people say I am?' and his followers had a list: 'Some say Elijah, or Jeremiah, or another of the prophets.' They even included some more recent heroes: 'Some say you are John the Baptist.'

Jesus asked them, 'But who do you say that I am?' Simon Peter said, 'You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God.'

Now, the Messiah was someone that the Jews had been waiting for: a person God would send to rescue them from their enemies. 'You are blessed, Simon,' Jesus said, 'because God, my Father in heaven, has given you this answer. From now on you will be known as Peter.' Jesus gave him this name because it means 'rock'.

'On this rock,' Jesus continued, 'I will build my Church, and even hell will not defeat it. I will give you the keys to the kingdom of heaven. Whatever you say is allowed on earth, will be allowed in heaven.' Then Jesus warned his disciples, 'Do not tell anyone that I am the Messiah.'

For the Children (& young at heart!)

In this week's Gospel reading Jesus asks his disciples who they say he is. He then says that he will build his church, but warns his disciples not to tell anyone that he is the Messiah (which means the anointed one - someone chosen by God to save the Jewish people). Jesus is asking his disciples to trust him, just like he asks us to trust him.

Activities:

- 1. Can you build a 'junk modelling' church with boxes, plastic bottles etc. that you have around the house? We would love to see your photos! Send them to stjameschurchbiddenham@gmail.com.
- 2. Put various items of different textures (e.g. jelly, hairbrush, cling film, frozen peas) into boxes and close the lids. Invite other members of your household to put their hands into the boxes without looking. Are they brave enough? Can they tell what the object is? Ask them how it feels to trust and not know what they will experience.
- 3. Play a game with your family. Each person writes the name of a famous person on a sticky note and sticks it on another person's forehead. You can each then ask 10 questions (which can only have yes or no as the answer) to try to find out who you are.


