A Reading for the Week

Matthew 14.22-33

Immediately he made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead to the other side, while he dismissed the crowds. And after he had dismissed the crowds, he went up the mountain by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, but by this time the boat, battered by the waves, was far from the land, for the wind was against them. And early in the morning he came walking towards them on the lake. But when the disciples saw him walking on the lake, they were terrified, saying, 'It is a ghost!' And they cried out in fear. But immediately Jesus spoke to them and said, 'Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid.'

Peter answered him, 'Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water.' He said, 'Come.' So Peter got out of the boat, started walking on the water, and came towards Jesus. But when he noticed the strong wind, he became frightened, and beginning to sink, he cried out, 'Lord, save me!' Jesus immediately reached out his hand and caught him, saying to him, 'You of little faith, why did you doubt?' When they got into the boat, the wind ceased. And those in the boat worshipped him, saying, 'Truly you are the Son of God.'

Service at St James on Sunday 9th

Services in our churches (or the churchyards if good weather) during August will be as follows:

Sundays 9th & 23rd August - 9.30am St James Sundays 16th & 30th August - 9.30am All Saints

Please read the following important notes on what to expect when attending Church

Face coverings must be worn by all those who attend (this is now a legal requirement) (if you are exempt please bring some evidence with you). We will have a few disposable face masks for use by anyone who has been unable to obtain one.

Please wash your hands before leaving home. You will be asked to sanitise your hands on entering and leaving the church.

A one-way system will operate in both the Church and the Churchyard. Please enter the churchyard via the entrance opposite the Church Barn. Entry to the church (if the service is inside) is by the main door. Please note the signs in place and follow the one way system once inside. You will be asked to exit via the Chancel door and the main Churchyard gates. Please adhere to social distancing requirements at all times when in the Church and Churchyard.

We are required to keep a register of attendees' names and contact numbers which can be used for the Track and Trace system if required. These details will be stored securely and disposed of after 21 days.

If you are in a vulnerable category we advise you not to attend these physical services, but this is ultimately your decision to make.

Please do not attend if you feel unwell.

Message from Rev Eric Lomax

This week I am away in North Wales, spending time on my own before our Churches begin to open. Snowdonia is one of my favourite locations in the UK. Here, amongst the mountains and the hills, I gain a sense of awe at the power of the landscape and how vulnerable we are to the weather and the elements.

Of course, these are early days after lockdown in Wales and now the border is again open many of the key locations are filled with tourists crowding into coffee shops, gift shops and pubs, desperate to have a break from the tied-up existence that they have experienced over the last six months. Flying to the beaches of the Mediterranean is simply not an option, so tourist locations in the UK are swamped. This is how we all feel.



As a child, North Wales was just a short drive away, so I know the landscape and I know the places of stillness and power which are off the beaten path. Today I took the road to Conwy and turned up an obscure road from the Hamlet of Trefriw. It is an awkward road that curls from left to right and two cars going in opposite directions would not be able to pass one another. The obstacles that I encountered were mountain sheep and a single cow that refused to move out of my way. I came to the end of the road and a path that was restricted to work vehicles. I walked the rest of the way and came to a dam. On the other side of the dam was Lyn Cowlyd reservoir. Not a soul around, surrounded by tall peaks and a pipeline that carries millions of tons of water to the people and industries of North Wales. Such a sense of stillness, yet at the same time, power. I felt, more than in any Church building, like I was in the presence of God.

I think we have to understand these encounters with the power of the natural world to understand the story of Peter walking on water. It is not a twee little story about Jesus tiptoeing on the pond. This was a storm and the fisherman, Peter, was clinging to the security of his old, familiar boat because that was the job he had done since he was an apprentice. He was like a child clinging to the edge of a swimming pool for safety. Jesus walking on the stormy waves was the Messiah, the son of God, who was confronting danger for our sake. 'I can do it,' Peter said, 'I can serve you in this dangerous world. Call me out. I can do it.'

Peter stepped out from the security of his old ways as a fisherman and it was only when he took his eyes off Jesus that he began to sink.

As our churches begin to open we are facing a world, a ministry, a call, into a world which will have changed beyond recognition. It is a dangerous and fearful world for us to serve the living Christ. Jesus wants us to be courageous and fearless, but more than that, he wants us to keep our eyes on him. He is our friend, our brother and our God. He calls, he saves, he guides, and it is him who calms the storm.


