Luke 14:16-24

¹⁶ Jesus replied: "A certain man was preparing a great banquet and invited many guests. ¹⁷ At the time of the banquet he sent his servant to tell those who had been invited, 'Come, for everything is now ready.'

¹⁸ "But they all alike began to make excuses. The first said, 'I have just bought a field, and I must go and see it. Please excuse me.'

¹⁹ "Another said, 'I have just bought five yoke of oxen, and I'm on my way to try them out. Please excuse me.'

²⁰ "Still another said, 'I just got married, so I can't come.'

²¹ "The servant came back and reported this to his master. Then the owner of the house became angry and ordered his servant, 'Go out quickly into the streets and alleys of the town and bring in the poor, the crippled, the blind and the lame.'

²² "'Sir,' the servant said, 'what you ordered has been done, but there is still room.'

²³ "Then the master told his servant, 'Go out to the roads and country lanes and compel them to come in, so that my house will be full. ²⁴ I tell you, not one of those who were invited will get a taste of my banquet.'"

Message from Rev Eric Lomax

What is the Christian message about? Is it just about being good and going to heaven? If we read it like that then we have utterly missed the point of God's Kingdom. The Bible tells us that creation is messed up, and that what we are looking for is a new creation. That new creation, according to the New Testament is embodied in the person of Jesus Christ. A good place to start in this understanding of Scripture is in the Gospel of St. Luke.

We don't know who wrote the Gospel of St. Luke. It was clearly written by the same person who wrote 'The Acts of the Apostles'. We know this because they both begin in exactly the same way; 'To me dear Theophilus.' We are not given the name Luke in the original Greek texts, but there is, indeed, good reason why we are given his name.

Luke is mentioned elsewhere in the New Testament, but not in the Gospels. In Paul's Letter to the Colossians (Col 4:14) Luke is referred to as a physician (from Greek for 'one who heals') and a follower of Paul. Choosing a doctor or physician is a perfect choice for a Gospel that seems to focus so much on healing.

In Jesus' time, as it is now, healing and wellbeing are essential. There are thirteen stories of healing in Luke's Gospel: 4:31-37; 4:38-44; 5:12-16; 5:17-26; 7:1-10; 7:11-17; 7:21; 8:26-39; 8:40-56; 9:37-45; 13:10-17; 17:11-19; and 18:35-43. These are all supernatural, in the sense that they do not reflect, in any way, the scientific practices of our medical technicians, but that is a reflection, largely of the limitations of the day. By healing people Jesus brings restoration to suffering people, and in a society that judged people's status by their health these healings represent the empowerment and freedom of the weak.



These healings are, to the Gospel writer, physical demonstrations of the coming kingdom of God, in which the relationships in community are restored and the power differential is reversed. The fulfilment of this is seen in Revelation 21 where sickness and injustice will come to an end. Ultimately this transformation depends on the power of God revealed in the power of his Spirit.

There is a sense that Jesus, in these stories, moves across the Judean countryside like a breeze, mending broken hearts, broken bodies and broken structures. It reminds me a little of the story of creation in Genesis where the author writes about the Spirit of God (Hebrew: Ruach, breath or wind) moving over the face of chaos, bringing order. In the ancient Near East, the origin of the Hebrew religion, it was the oceans that symbolised chaos and disorder.

All of this extends far beyond the healing of the physical body. In Luke 4, Jesus declares himself the fulfilment of the words of the prophet Isaiah; "The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free." In this, he proclaims the healing of the Human heart, the overturning of oppression and injustice and the restoration of our vision.



This echoes perfectly the Song of Mary, the Magnificat, in Luke Chapter 1, in which the mother of Jesus proclaims that in Jesus, God has 'brought down the mighty from their thrones and lifted up the lowly.' The power of this song is that this is a woman in a deeply patriarchal culture who stands as the humble revolutionary who proclaims the power of Jesus to exalt the weak and crush the oppressor. To Luke, the physician, liberation from oppression is as much about healing as the healing of the woman with the curved spine (Luke 13). With analysis it would be easy to see that the two fall into the same category.

The Theologian Jürgen Moltmann sums this up beautifully, by writing, "Jesus' healings are not supernatural miracles in a natural world. They are the only truly 'natural' thing in a world that is unnatural, demonised, and wounded." From Moltmann's perspective, these are substantial signs that through Jesus, God is putting our world to right. He is mending what is broken in our bodies, our hearts, our minds, and in the way our communities are constructed. Jesus' healings are revolution and recreation

So, in this complex Gospel story today which I have barely touched upon, apart from its overall context in the physician's Gospel, the Kingdom is shown as a wedding banquet, with which the powerful have failed to engage, and the King throws open doors to the poor, the crippled, the blind and the lame. As Jesus states, again in Luke's Gospel, it is not the healthy who need the physician, but rather the sick (Luke 5:30), and the physician will not fail to heal all who are broken. Trust him.

<u>Please read the following important notes on</u> what to expect when attending Church

We are required to keep a register of attendees' names and contact numbers which can be used for the Track and Trace system if required. These details will be stored securely and disposed of after 21 days.

If you are in a vulnerable category we advise you not to attend these physical services, but this is ultimately your decision to make.

Please do not attend if you feel unwell.

At St James's, numbers will be very limited (we can only fit approx. 20-25 in church safely). We advise you to arrive early and apologise in advance if there is insufficient room.


