A Reading for the Week

Matthew 22.15-22

15 Then the Pharisees went and plotted to entrap him in what he said. 16So they sent their disciples to him, along with the Herodians, saying, 'Teacher, we know that you are sincere, and teach the way of God in accordance with truth, and show deference to no one; for you do not regard people with partiality. ¹⁷Tell us, then, what you think. Is it lawful to pay taxes to the emperor, or not?' 18 But Jesus, aware of their malice, said, 'Why are you putting me to the test, you hypocrites? ¹⁹Show me the coin used for the tax.' And they brought him a denarius. ²⁰Then he said to them, 'Whose head is this, and whose title?' ²¹They answered, 'The emperor's.' Then he said to them, 'Give therefore to the emperor the things that are the emperor's, and to God the things that are God's.'22When they heard this, they were amazed; and they left him and went away.

Message from Rev Eric Lomax

In 2012, I remember visiting Manhattan Island in New York, and seeing the Imagine Memorial in Central Park. It was dedicated to the great singer songwriter John Lennon who was murdered by a crazed gun man, Mark Chapman, just a few hundred metres away. The memorial was very moving and a very bubbly American woman said to me; 'He was such a great New Yorker.'

I answered her by saying 'He was born just a few miles from me.'

The woman thought for a moment and replied 'You sound like you are English, but you were born in New York as well?'

The imagine memorial is named after one of his most famous peace songs; Imagine, in which he talked about the removal of those things that separate us and cause conflict; religion, wealth, nationalism and possessions.

The word Imagine comes from the Latin imago, which means to picture, and it is the same word as the Greek one that Jesus uses in our Bible story; 'Whose image is on this coin?' Jesus used it in response to a trick question by the Pharisees and the Herodians. They asked him whether it was right for people to pay taxes.

It was very strange that these people were working together in this as Pharisees and Herodians would not ordinarily talk to each other. The Roman Empire was a vast mechanism that required lots of money to keep its military and political cogs moving and that meant that the people in Roman occupied territories were stung for taxes. Most of the religious groups, especially the Pharisees, hated this imposition on Jewish communities by a gentile foreign power. Their take on it was that they should do all they could to avoid paying tax.

We do not know very much about the Herodians, but we do know they were Hellenistic Jews which meant that their religious ideology emerged from the Greek occupation of Judea under Alexander the Great. They were largely in sympathy with imposed Jewish monarchy of Herod the Great. The point is that Herod was actually a client King, part of the Roman machine; there to keep the Jewish people in order.

Herod wanted the taxes because it was his job to want the taxes, so the Herodians believed that taxes should be paid. 'Is it right that we should pay taxes?'

It was a clever question because Jesus could not win. Either answer would offend one of them, so Jesus asked them the question; 'Whose image is on this coin?'

The Jewish faith is very clear, any kind of image of either God or a foreign God is Blasphemy, and is forbidden in the Torah (the Jewish Law). In Roman ideology Caesar is not only an emperor but is also a god, so for this reason Roman coins were forbidden in the Jewish Temple. On the outskirts of the temple you would find hundreds of money changers who would exchange Jewish coinage, with no image, for the Roman coinage, at grossly inflated prices. This was so the Jewish worshippers could pay tithes in the Temple with money that was acceptable to the Almighty. Nothing about God.



The image on the coin was Caesars and both Pharisee and Herodian had to acknowledge this. Jesus replied; 'Then give unto Caesar what is Caesar's, and give unto God what is God's.'

If I had tried to teach on this passage before I took my degree in Theology I probably would have given a political sermon on paying taxes, but not now. Jesus had no interest in the question about taxes; He was interested in them, and he is interested in you.

In the creation story in Genesis one, we are told something beautiful about who we are, or rather who we are meant to be. John Lennon's Imagine may have presented an image of what the world might be, but it did not present an image of who he actually was.

Liverpool Airport was renamed 'John Lennon Airport,' in 2001, twenty one years after he was

murdered. People in Liverpool often joke about John Lennon saying that it is called John Lennon airport because it was the first place he went to when he saw the colour of money. Talented? Definitely! Wealthy? Absolutely! Narcissistic? Without doubt. His wealth utterly separated him from his Liverpool, lower middle class origins. The utopia of his song really was just in his imagination, so easy to see from the window of his expensive 72nd Street, New York apartment. The idealism of his song was not his real face.

In the creation we get a wonderful picture of what God wants us to be; 'So God created mankind in his own image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them.' (Genesis 1:27) The creation story then tells how humanity turns from God in disobedience. We turn from him, and God's image is distorted.

What image did Jesus see when he looked into the faces of the Pharisee and the Herodian? They were both Jews. They had responsibilities to the world, but as devout followers of the one God, Yahweh, they also had responsibility to their creator, the one whom they claimed to worship. Jesus, who sees all, so wanted to see the image of the creator in their faces, but instead he saw their anger, their arrogance, their greed, and their deception. Give to the world what belongs to the world, but do not forget your responsibility to him. When you look into the mirror; whose face do you see?

Please do not attend if you feel unwell.

At St James's, numbers will be very limited (we can only fit approx. 20-25 in church safely).



For the Children (& young at heart!)

This week we are looking at another one of Paul's letters - this time to the Thessalonians. Chapter 1 verses 4, 5a, 6 and 7a are as follows:

For we know, brothers and sisters beloved by God, that he has chosen you, because our message of the gospel came to you not in word only, but also in power and in the Holy Spirit and with full conviction. And you became imitators of us and of the Lord, for in spite of persecution you received the word with joy inspired by the Holy Spirit, so that you became an example to all the believers.

Thessalonians is the oldest book in the New Testament. It was written only a few years after the crucifixion of Jesus. The passage helps us to know that each one of us is chosen by God and that he wants us to be an example to others. How can we be a positive influence on our friends, family, community and society as a whole?
