Message from Rev Eric Lomax

I did not come from a wealthy home, and as a child, I never really had the things that my friends had. My mum worked for a catalogue company and used to drive round people's homes selling them items and clothes that they would buy, and then later she would have the job of driving round to those same homes collecting weekly payments from those same people. The fact is that the people on these estates were very poor and often they did not have the money to pay her. She would then get in trouble if the collections did not match what was expected. She was a caring person and in her job she was caught between a rock and a hard place; the expectation of her company and compassion for the customers who could not pay.

There were no benefits to her job. We could not afford a car, so the job gave her a van to take us on holiday. She was an artist and loved the hills so she would put myself, my sister and our cousins, Susan and Carole, in the back of the van and take us to North Wales or the Lake District. As a child I just remember feeling travel sick all the time, being taken on bumpy journeys in the back of this old Bedford van. The other benefit of her job was that she had 10% discounts on the items she sold and I remember wanting the new white England football strip to take to school. I asked her over and over again if she would buy me one and even with the discount she was not sure if she could afford it. I remember clearly her saying to me one day; 'It is not the clothes you wear on the outside that matter, but the clothes you wear on the inside.'

I thought it was such a stupid thing to say and carried on asking for the football strip. In the end she bought it for me. If only I had been any good at football.

It is only much later in life that you realise how important that is and how close it is to the meaning

Colossians 3.12-17

As God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness and patience. ¹³Bear with one another and, if anyone has a complaint against another, forgive each other; just as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. 14Above all, clothe yourselves with love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. ¹⁵And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in the one body. And be thankful. 16Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly; teach and admonish one another in all wisdom; and with gratitude in your hearts sing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs to God. ¹⁷And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him.

of our reading this week. The religious people at the time of Jesus had been so focussed on the external gloss of religion that Jesus used to remind them that what really matters is the human heart. In Matthew 5 Jesus spoke about the qualities that his followers should have rather than the superficiality of looking good through following rules; 'Blessed are the poor in Spirit, Blessed are the Meek, Blessed are the Merciful, Blessed are the pure in heart.' These are all qualities of the heart, a spiritual rather than a physical attire. To his listeners that was so different from the religious expectations to follow the binary opposites of the commandments.

Paul, in Galatians 5.22-23, talks about these inner qualities that spring from the heart, referring to them as Fruit of the Spirit, Love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, faithfulness, goodness, gentleness and self-control.

These are all qualities that well up within us like a spring of living water (John 4.14).

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Message from Rev Eric Lomax continued

When I was in Wilson Carlile College in the 1980s there was a very tall man training with me from Liverpool; a very committed evangelical Christian. I remember Peter being wrong about most things, but really funny at the same time. While we were there a very posh ball was held for retired Royal Navy officers and their wives. Our college was in Blackheath, close to Greenwich Naval College, and for some reason their main hall in Greenwich needed some refurbishment, so our hall was a plan B. As students we were asked to serve everybody with canapes and I remember Peter, with his ill-fitting suit, looking at them and shaking his head; 'Clothes don't make a man,' he said, 'It is not by our suits but by our fruits that we should be known.'



Our faith reverses the standards of our society that makes appearance, status and etiquette the standards by which we have meaning and purpose. John the Baptist was very clear about this when he addressed the religious people in the wilderness; 'And do not think you can say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our father.' I tell you that out of these stones God can raise up children for Abraham.'

This is the God that undermines the value of our world and places the internal above the external. We are meant to reflect the image of God and this is when God stares deeply into our eyes and sees his own reflection staring back at him.

He calls us to his sacred ballroom and we need to be dressed properly for that occasion. So Paul calls us to wear our inner clothes of compassion, kindness, humility, meekness and patience. These are the qualities that we should clearly demonstrate in the ways we reach out to him and to others. I would echo my friend Peter in saying that it does not matter how we are physically dressed, what matters to God is what he sees in the depth of our hearts.

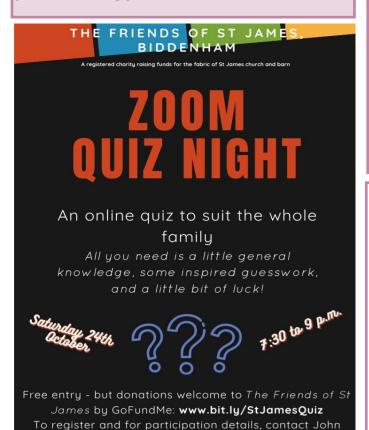

For the Children (& young at heart!)

This week we continue looking at Paul's first letter to the Thessalonians, with Chapter 2, verses 7b and 8.

But we were gentle among you, like a nurse tenderly caring for her own children. So deeply do we care for you that we are determined to share with you not only the gospel of God but also our own selves, because you have become very dear to us.

In this passage God is calling us to love selflessly and be gentle in our lives. Can you think of times when you have needed to be gentle? Perhaps with a small animal or with younger brothers or sisters? Why do you think you needed to be gentle?

Activities:

Draw a picture of yourself on a piece of paper then draw pictures of all the people who care for you. They might include your family, carers, friends, teachers, other people at school, people at church etc.

Make a thick mixture of cornflour and water in a bowl using a wooden spoon. Tip it out onto a tray or flat bowl. Try making letters in the mixture - do you notice that when you are gentle with it you can move your fingers easily, but if you force or push hard, the mixture becomes more solid?
