Mark 4:26-29

The Parable of the Growing Seed

He also said, "This is what the kingdom of God is like. A man scatters seed on the ground. Night and day, whether he sleeps or gets up, the seed sprouts and grows, though he does not know how. All by itself the soil produces grain - first the stalk, then the head, then the full kernel in the head. As soon as the grain is ripe, he puts the sickle to it, because the harvest has come.

Message from Rev Eric Lomax

It is harvest time, and this year we cannot celebrate in the same way that we have in the past. It is a period of thankfulness when we are reminded that the earth is the Lord's (Psalm 24:1) and that he is our creator. In our greed and arrogance, we should turn to the father from whom all things come, and we recognise our responsibility to be faithful stewards of the gifts that he has given us (Genesis 1:28).

In 1917, two young girls in the village of Cottingley, near Bradford, Elsie Wright and Frances Griffiths, borrowed a camera. The camera, a quarter-plate 'Midg' camera, made by Houghton-Butcher, belonged to Elsie's father and it was capable of producing images on four glass negatives. After they had finished with it, they took it home and Elsie's father developed the photographs in his own home. The pictures that formed in the red light of his darkroom were perfectly focused black and white images of the girls playing by the side of the river and around them danced a party of fairies.

Of course people questioned the authenticity of the photographs, but they made the front cover of the Christmas edition of 'The Strand' magazine.

Sceptics had them analysed by experts, who found them to be legitimate and celebrities such as Arthur

Everyone in our church family is welcome to attend these meetings, although you will only be entitled to vote if you are on the Electoral Roll. Zoom login details will be the same as for the Sunday Virtch services.

Electoral Roll

Notice is given that the Church Electoral Rolls (membership lists) are being revised.

Any person is entitled to have their name entered on the roll if they are a) baptised, b) aged 16 or over and c) either i) a member of the Church of England or of a Church in communion with it and is resident in the parish; ii) a member of the Church of England or of a Church in communion with it, is not resident in the parish, but has habitually attended public worship in the parish during the preceding six months or iii) a member in good standing of a Church which is not in communion with the Church of England but subscribes to the doctrine of the Holy Trinity, and are also a member of the Church of England and have habitually attended public worship in the parish during the preceding six months, or would have done but have been prevented from doing so.

Message from Rev Eric Lomax continued

Conan Doyle (the author of the Sherlock Holmes stories) came out in full support of the images. All of this happened while over in France the blood of thousands of men was being spilled on the battlefields of Ypres and Nivelle.

One of the difficulties that prevented the potential fraud from being exposed was the status of women and young girls. Two young girls, of course, could not have possibly forged such technically perfect images of fairies. Quite literally, people would have much rather believed in fairies than girls who were capable of faking them. This was ironic in that while most of the young men of Europe were ripping each other apart, it was effectively the women that were running the country. It would still be eleven years before women were considered competent enough to vote.

Back in the 21st Century, as much as I talk freely and with conviction about equality, I would say that I am still very bad at carrying out even the most basis of household chores. I do try to iron things, clean the carpets, wipe the surfaces, fill and empty the dishwasher and even, from time to time, do some of the washing and ironing. Liz will then often go back and say, "I'll go back and do it properly". She finds it inexplicable how the shirt I have taken off still has the buttons fastened and how I could possibly manage to fill the dishwasher so badly. I do believe, however, that she has some help, as from time to time I will ask her how a shirt I had taken off earlier that day, finds itself perfectly folded and placed in a pile next to the wardrobe. "That," she says "is because the fairies did it!"

There is an arrogance in patriarchy that does not recognise dependency. When Elsie and Frances were creating their dreams it was the women who were harvesting the fields, maintaining the machines, bringing up the children and even creating the weapons to help the men blow each other apart. Women were the hidden force in our world, as they often are now.

There should never be hierarchies in society based on suppression, but rather mutual servitude based on gratitude. Last week in Philippians we were reminded of this in Paul's call for us to mirror Christ's humility (Philippians 2:1-11). The word 'humble' comes from the Latin humilis,

meaning 'ground'. To be on the same level, to lower ourselves to the ground, is the perfect imitation of Christ

Very simply our Gospel reading lies at the core of this message. The farmer acts like a servant. He is humble, because he recognises the servant who is outside himself. He plants the seed, then he lays down on the ground, and while he sleeps, it is the servant God who causes the seed to grow. In this farmer's world there are no social hierarchies. Men do not stand above women, the rich do not stand above the poor, nor one race above another. It is God himself who deserves our gratitude. 'There is neither Jew nor Gentile, neither slave nor free, nor is there male and female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus.' (Galations 3:28)

Services in Church

Sunday services in our churches (churchyards if good weather) will be at 9.30am as follows:

Sundays 11, 25 Oct - All Saints Sundays 4, 18 Oct - St James

<u>Please read the following important notes on what to expect when attending Church</u>

Face coverings must be worn by all those who attend when the service is inside (this is a legal requirement) (if you are exempt please bring some evidence with you). A few disposable face masks will be available for use by anyone who has been unable to obtain one.

Please wash your hands before leaving home and sanitise your hands on entering/leaving church.

A one-way system will operate in both the Church and the Churchyard. Please note the signs in place and follow the directions of the sidesmen. Please adhere to social distancing requirements at all times when in the Church and Churchyard.

We are required to keep a register of attendees' names and contact numbers which can be used for the Track and Trace system if required. These details will be stored securely and disposed of after 21 days.

If you are in a vulnerable category we advise you not to attend these physical services, but this is ultimately your decision to make.

Please do not attend if you feel unwell.

At St James's, once the services are inside the church, numbers will be very limited (we can only fit approx. 20-25 in church safely). We advise you to arrive early and apologise in advance if there is insufficient room.

The forecast for this Sunday is varied - we will try to be outside if possible so please wear something warm, but we will be inside if it rains.



For the Children (& young at heart!)

We continue look at Paul's letter to the Philippians this week, chapter 3, verses 13-14.

"My friends, I don't feel that I have already arrived. But I forget what is behind, and I struggle for what is ahead. I run toward the goal, so that I can win the prize of being called to heaven. This is the prize that God offers because of what Christ Jesus has done."

Paul talks about a prize and running towards a goal. Think about when you might have been in a race - what helped you reach your goal? If Christ is our goal, what sort of things could we do to keep moving towards him? We could pray, try to live like Jesus lived - being kind and compassionate and letting other people see Jesus through the way that we live.

Activity:

Draw a picture of yourself on a large piece of paper (you can get other members of your houseold to do the same). Then write things about yourself around the outside e.g. sporty, musical, caring. Ask others in your household to write things about you. Your picture shows that you are uniquely made by God - knowing who we are and what makes us "us" is important to us and to God.

Prayer:

Lord Jesus, we go to meet our friends and family. We're looking forward, not back. We press on to do your will. We're going on our way with Jesus. Amen.
