A Reading for the Week

Mark 1:1-8

¹The beginning of the good news about Jesus the Messiah, the Son of God, ²as it is written in Isaiah the prophet: "I will send my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way"- 3"a voice of one calling in the wilderness, 'Prepare the way for the LORD, make straight paths for him." ⁴And so John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness, preaching a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. ⁵The whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem went out to him. Confessing their sins, they were baptized by him in the Jordan River. ⁶John wore clothing made of camel's hair. with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. ⁷And this was his message: "After me comes the one more powerful than I, the straps of whose sandals I am not worthy to stoop down and untie. 8I baptize you with water, but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit.

Message from Rev Eric Lomax

What is your experience of life and what is your experience of faith? For many people religion can be judgmental. It can be a closed door to those who are not part of the club who do not follow the rules. People who walk through the doors of a Church do not necessarily feel that they are amongst friends.

In the same way people in life may experience isolation, fear, illness, loneliness, poverty, hunger and rejection. For them the voice of God seems silent. It is hard believing in a god for whom there is no evidence of existence. Such a god does not speak to them or provide them with any answers that they cry out for. They would cry out if they felt that somebody was listening.

Churches also can be places in which the voice of God is misrepresented, instilling in people an over emphasis on judgement, condemnation, fear. This god only makes them feel inadequate or places the burden of guilt upon their shoulders.

Our reading today is from the beginning of Mark's gospel. The first sentence introduces us to a new concept of God which is quite simply an emphasis on good news. The word Gospel means good news and the author immediately associates that good news with Jesus Christ; This is the good news of Jesus Christ the son of God. I wonder how many of us in normal times walk into a church and expect to hear good news. This would be such a step forward in the witness of the church when good news is such a rare commodity in the modern world.

Mark's gospel does not begin with the Christmas Story. We have no angels, we have no shepherds or wise men. We do not have Mary and Joseph or a Virgin birth, but what we do have is a wilderness. 'There is a voice crying out in the wilderness,' we are told.

The wilderness is such an important theme in the Bible. When Adam and Eve sinned for the first time they were cast into the wilderness, and when the Israelites were set free from slavery they wandered around in the wilderness for 40 years.

The wilderness was a place of isolation that fell outside the grace and the love of God. It was a place that was filled with danger and uncertainty. In the story of Moses we are reminded that even in the wilderness God is with us. He gave his children the commandments in the wilderness and he fed them with bread from heaven. God is not absent from the wilderness. He is there with us.

At the time that Mark's gospel begins God had seemed silent for many years. There had been no prophets and Israel had been invaded by multiple foreign armies. The Israelites felt alone and abandoned by him. They had understood the Covenant (promise) that God had given them as meaning that he would liberate Israel from foreign invaders, and through a promised Messiah, God would again set Israel above their enemies establishing a Kingdom of justice and peace. Sadly, however, God had been silent for so long that this was unlikely to happen. For Israel this was a time of wilderness, a time of hopelessness, and a time of despair

The Israelites' vision focussed very much on themselves. To them, it was the gentiles that belonged in the wilderness. It was the Israelites who were to be recipients of the promise of God. God's message was just for them.

There was minimum provision for what were known as proselytes. Proselytes were Gentiles who were permitted into the Jewish faith. Some Jews saw a kind of Baptism as a way into this. To join the club, they had to undergo ritual washing or baptism. Then, if that was not enough they would have to be circumcised and follow every detail of Jewish law. This, however, was rare, so if you were once an outsider then you were always an outsider.

Mark's Gospel then introduces us to John the Baptist. John is described as a voice crying in the wilderness and he very much mirrors the Old Testament Prophets.

John is in the Wilderness, outside Jewish territory, so his audience is the Gentiles. He does something unusual in that he makes the proselyte route the norm rather than the exception. He preaches repentance for the forgiveness of sins and seals that with Baptism. This is a message for the outsider. There is a new Israel and God accepts all, not just the religious people. Unlike the Pharisees and Sadducees at the time his belief draws in the outsider and accepts all.

Of course the religious come to hear what is going on and instead of John speaking to them as if they are on the same team he actually turns his guns on them and condemns their hypocrisy; 'Do not be so judgemental,' the other gospels quote him as saying, 'Do not speak of yourselves as being Children of Israel, because God can raise up children of Israel from these very stones.' (Matthew 3:9)


It is here that John the Baptist talks about the source of this good news. He says, 'There is one who comes after me, whose sandals I am not worthy to stoop down and untie.' He then goes on to say, 'I baptise with water, but he will baptise with the Holy Spirit.'

This is the key. John was very much about washing people so that they could become part of Israel. Jesus however was going to bypass the religious expectation altogether. He was inviting the outsider to be filled with a Spirit of life and truth. That kind of Baptism is about transforming your heart and not just making you religious.

This is Good News, because whatever your experience of life is, there is Good News for you, and with the loving Spirit of God, a) you will be accepted completely by God, whoever you are and whatever you have done, and b) your life and circumstances, whatever form they take, can be transformed by the Spirit of God through our Lord Jesus Christ.

For the Children (& young at heart!)

In this week's reading we hear about John the Baptist. The story is all about John the Baptist appearing in the wilderness to prepare the way for Jesus, just as Jesus prepares the way to God.

Activities

Play a game with your family as though you are travelling home from the wilderness, just like John the Baptist. The aim of the game is to get from one side of the room/garden to the other. Each person takes turns to roll a dice. They step forward one pace towards 'home' for an even number, two paces for an odd number, but if they roll a six then they have to take one step backwards. The game continues until everyone has safely reached 'home'.

Think about the 'wilderness'. Where is a 'wilderness' place for you? Is it perhaps a local wood or forest or a big open space? What are the dangers and beauty of a wilderness space? Then think about the word 'home' and what it means to you. What things are important about your home and what makes it a special place?
