Alone or Lonely on Christmas Day?



A Reading for the Week John 1:1-14

1 In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ² He was with God in the beginning. ³ Through him all things were made; without him nothing was made that has been made. ⁴ In him was life, and that life was the light of all mankind. ⁵ The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.

⁶ There was a man sent from God whose name was John. ⁷ He came as a witness to testify concerning that light, so that through him all might believe. ⁸ He himself was not the light; he came only as a witness to the light.

⁹ The true light that gives light to everyone was coming into the world. ¹⁰ He was in the world, and though the world was made through him, the world did not recognize him. ¹¹ He came to that which was his own, but his own did not receive him. ¹² Yet to all who did receive him, to those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God - ¹³ children born not of natural descent, nor of human decision or a husband's will, but born of God. ¹⁴ The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth.

Message from Rev Eric Lomax

I am so sorry that you have had to endure such a painful year. It was heart-breaking that we could not celebrate Easter and most of us thought that around the summer all this would come to an end, but we hadn't predicted so many factors. Less than a week ago most of us believed that we could at least celebrate Christmas with the people closest to us. Yes of course it would be limited but at least we would be surrounded by loved ones. But then on Saturday the body blow that we did not wish to hear - most of the south-east would be completely locked down and travelling between homes would be forbidden. The physical church worship was of course exempt from these rules but still local clergy like myself had to listen to people around us and make judgements on how we should do things. Christmas would not be the kind of Christmas that we expected or wanted.

Before I continue, I need to say that I share these feelings with you. This time has been challenging for myself and for my family and I, like many of you, experience waves of fear and anxiety. When I pray I listen to the voice that tells me that we should not be afraid.

We have always felt quite lucky as a family in the way that we celebrated Christmas. We have a large family with five children and their partners, so we know more than most how lucky we are to have more than we need. In a home that has ample, sometimes there are little gifts that we are never quite sure who they belong to - they seem insignificant and sometimes only get discovered when the celebrations are over.

I want you to give some thought to this little gift. Imagine you are celebrating the perfect Christmas, and this gift appears beneath the tree, under everything else. You go and retrieve it. Then you sit down to open it with a glass of something in your hand. It is wrapped simply in brown paper which you remove, revealing a small miniature nativity scene. There is a tiny house with a star suspended above it. There are animals, two shepherds, a woman and a man, standing over a manger and in the manger, a tiny insignificant figure, a baby. This was the smallest gift and the one that takes up the least space, yet we must not lose sight of it.

Service in Church Cancelled

Given the Tier 4 restrictions there will be no service at St James's on Sunday 27 December. We are in the process of reviewing our plans for services in Church in the New Year.

This unexpected Christmas, when so much of what we would hope for is missing, that tiny gift remains almost missed in the darkness of a pandemic and all the heartache that brings. I do not want to devalue those things we have lost. We do need our families and our friends. We need the hugs. We do need the eyes that we love staring back at us and the feeling of warmth and celebration. I miss, more than anything, the chance to sing carols with others around us. We must not forget, however, that in all this darkness, the Christ child is still here. He has not abandoned us; he has not left us.

God has not come to us in the tinsel packaging that we are most familiar with. He comes in unexpected ways even during unexpected times. I would urge you not to burden yourselves with the low-lying cloud of despair that seems to hang in our sky, as the Christ who carried his own cross to Calvary is more than strong enough to bear that weight. The Bible reminds us that it is the people who dwell in darkness who have seen a great light (Isaiah 9:2). We are also reminded that the light shines in the darkness and the darkness has not defeated it (John 1:5).

One could say that the Christmases of previous years have been a time of collective forgetting. We forget the core of Christmas, we forget the narrative that tells us that the Word became flesh and lives amongst us (John 1:14), and we forget that small, simply wrapped gift under the tree.

This year, however, when so much is stripped away, it is a time to remember that there is hope, salvation and healing in the birth of the Christ-Child.

I hope that in all this uncertainty you will be able to keep focussed on that which can really transform our lives and our world. You are loved.
