Message from Revd Eric Lomax

Before I came to Kempston and Biddenham, I had seven parish churches, beautiful old buildings. Six of them were medieval, and in the twelfth century church of St John the Baptist, Colsterworth, was an ancient stone cross (or the remains of it), with familiar Celtic motifs that predated the church by five hundred years. If I travel up north, I will still go and sit in that beautiful building. Sir Isaac Newton was Baptised in the font there in 1643, and I have a copy of the Baptism register bearing his name.

The church has beautiful stained-glass windows, and on a bright summer morning, around 11am, the sun shines through the South window on the cross, casting a rainbow of light upon the ancient stone. It is beautiful.

Two miles up the A1 is one of the other former parish churches. The Gothic church of Holy Cross, Great Ponton has a fifteenth century tower (most church towers are a lot newer than the original buildings) that is vastly out of proportion to the rest of the building. The house next door belonged to a wonderful West-Indian man who was the stunt coordinator of a number of major Hollywood films, and wanted to celebrate the church, together with his house because it contains the most complete collection of renaissance wall paintings in the UK. I find the cavernous church challenging because of one simple factor.

Message from Revd Eric Lomax

The dark-wood reredos (panel behind the altar) contains all ten commandments from Exodus 20, in large, bold letters, the impact of which is to riddle anybody who sits in the pews with buckets of guilt.

Did you know that there is actually no such thing as an altar in an Anglican Church? An altar is an old testament concept which was used by the people of Israel to sacrifice animals to their God, Yahweh. The Bible talks about Jesus being the one final sacrifice (Hebrews 10:1-18) who died for us, to restore our relationship with God. If this is the Jesus that we believe in then there is no longer any need for us to sacrifice anything. Jesus has done it all.



Of course, in our society, we still feel in our bones that sacrifices are necessary. Innocent or guilty, we like our scapegoats. Sometimes these scapegoats feel immensely justified, such as this month's scapegoat, Matt Hancock. Mostly we need to step back and think whether, given our own hidden, or not so hidden failures, sacrificing somebody or something else serves any purpose at all. Even in the Old Testament, some 500 years before Jesus was born, it is declared that God does not want sacrifices, (Micah 6:1-4, 6-8), but rather, our God, Yahweh, the father of our Lord Jesus Christ, wants justice and mercy.

The commandments, although they provide a good basis for modern law, belong somewhere else, rather than over the communion table. A simple cross is placed upon the altar in Holy Cross church, which reminds me and you that, although I am rubbish at being good, what matters is what the one good man, Jesus Christ, has done for us.

The All Age Bit!

This week we are exploring the story of dancing King David which you can find in the Bible at 2 Samuel 6 verses 1-5. Why do you think David celebrated and danced when the Ark of the Lord was brought to Jerusalem? The Ark of the Covenant was built to carry the stone tablets containing the laws that God had written for his people. God gave instructions to Moses of how it should look and be constructed. Earlier in 1 Samuel 4, the Philistines captured the Ark of the Covenant but it caused so many problems for them that they returned it. When it was brought back to Jerusalem it was a reminder that God was with his people and that God's promises and agreements with his people had not changed.

Activities:

Musical instruments: make a musical instrument from recycled materials:

- Decorate an empty bottle or tube and fill it with dried rice, lentils or pasta to make a shaker;
- Stretch elastic bands of different sizes across an empty plastic tub. Decorate the tub and then play your instrument by plucking on the elastic bands;
- Fill some empty bottles or jars with different amounts of water and then tap them with pencils or spoons to see what different sounds you can make.

Active Worship: There are so many different ways that we can show our love for God and worship Him.

- Put on a favourite worship song and praise God with music, singing, dancing and instruments;
- Get creative and worship God through crafting, drawing or painting;
- Worship God through sharing love and serving others:
- Worship God by taking care of his creation, eg by collecting litter in your local area.
