Bishop of Bedford's Visit

This Sunday the Bishop of Bedford will be visiting. As many of you know, Sue Richards was licensed as a Lay Reader during the Covid pandemic. As a result of restrictions in place at the time, it was not possible for members of our parishes to support her at her licensing serviced. The Bishop will therefore spend some time during the 9.30am service at St James's acknowledging Sue's licensing and praying for her. We hope that as many people as possible will come to the service to support Sue.

A Reading for the Week Mark 10.35-45

James and John, the sons of Zebedee, came forward to him and said to him, 'Teacher, we want you to do for us whatever we ask of you.' And he said to them, 'What is it you want me to do for you?' And they said to him, 'Grant us to sit, one at your right hand and one at your left, in your glory.' But Jesus said to them, 'You do not know what you are asking. Are you able to drink the cup that I drink, or be baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with?' They replied, 'We are able.' Then Jesus said to them, 'The cup that I drink you will drink; and with the baptism with which I am baptized, you will be baptized; but to sit at my right hand or at my left is not mine to grant, but it is for those for whom it has been prepared.'

When the ten heard this, they began to be angry with James and John. So Jesus called them and said to them, 'You know that among the Gentiles those whom they recognize as their rulers lord it over them, and their great ones are tyrants over them. But it is not so among you; but whoever wishes to become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wishes to be first among you must be slave of all. For the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life a ransom for many.'

Message from Rev Eric Lomax

Jesus turns everything upside down.

We looked at an almost identical version of this story in one of the other gospels, just a few weeks ago. In the alternative version (Matthew 20), it is the mother of James and John who came to Jesus on their behalf. Here in Mark's Gospel, it is the two sons of thunder themselves who come to Jesus, both seeking glory in heaven, and it casts a light on ourselves and on our own sense of worthiness. There is something in us that feels that we should be, or would rather be, at the front of the queue, whether it is in one of the recent queues for a few drops of unleaded petrol, the upcoming queues we are likely to find in our supply-stretched supermarkets over the lead up to Christmas, or in the proverbial, post-mortem queue for the pearly gates.

Unlike the version in Matthew's Gospel, we are reminded here that the 'selfish gene' causes us to want the best for ourselves, and not only to fulfil the expectations of our families.

I guess that behind this as well is the assumption that God's Kingdom is somehow a reflection of this world, that the values that give worth to finance and status are somehow reflected in heaven. The Gospels, however, tell us something completely different. At the heart of the Christian message is the cross of Jesus Christ, a crown of thorns and a blood stained robe being torn apart by the social vultures of this world (Matthew 27:35). Even at the point of death we, the human race, seem to cry out, 'what is in it for me?'

The Gospel stories, which emerged out of the Christian mission which extended in the heart of Greek and Roman culture, subverted the glorious conclusions of Roman narrative by having the Hero strip himself to his waist and bow down in humility to wash the feet of his disciples.

We see, in the Bible, the conflicts of power within the mindsets of the apostles, which seem to impose patriarchal principles on the imposition of power on the early church, but at the heart of scripture we have Paul's declaration that in Christ, there is neither rich nor poor, slave nor free, Jew nor Gentile, male nor female, because all are equal in Christ Jesus (Galatians 3:28). In the same way, Jesus demands that the rich man must give up his wealth to enter God's Kingdom, because not to do so would be like a camel trying to pass through the eye of a needle, and that Mary proclaimed the greatness of the Lord because, in Christ, he has brought down the mighty from their thrones and lifted up the lowly (Luke 1:46-55). Paul, in 1 Corinthians 12 and 13, is very clear that in the ministry of the Church there should be no self proclaimed crowns of Charismatic gifts, but actually what gives power and greatness to his people is the simple, self giving of God's sacrificial love (Agape). This love, humility and servanthood is the perfect, complete reflection of his Kingdom (1 Corinthians 13:12), and we only have the capacity for love because he first loved us (1 John 4:19).

This is the pure counter-culture of God's Kingdom. He turns everything upside down. Our culture of wealth, of power and of control. The Gospels tell us that Jesus wants people to be the complete opposite of this. He wants us to centre our lives around the cross; lovers, and servants who proclaim his message with a bowl and a towel around the waist, mirroring Christ himself, for the son of man came not to be served but to serve, and give himself as a ransom for many.

There is a verse in Leviticus 19 v18 which says that when we serve others we put their needs first, we can serve them by making sure they have what they need.

Activities

You could perhaps promise to help with cleaning your bedroom, or making someone a cup of tea, helping with the shopping, or doing your homework without having to be asked. You could decorate the front of your 'cheque book' and also decorate each 'cheque'. Scavenger hunt: hold a scavenger hunt where one person calls out an object and everyone has to race to bring that object the fastest, e.g. a pencil, Bible, shoe, sock, cuddly toy. The winner at the
