

A Reading for the Week

John 18:33-37

Pilate then went back inside the palace, summoned Jesus and asked him, "Are you the king of the Jews?" "Is that your own idea," Jesus asked, "or did others talk to you about me?"

"Am I a Jew?" Pilate replied. "Your own people and chief priests handed you over to me. What is it you have done?"

Jesus said, "My kingdom is not of this world. If it were, my servants would fight to prevent my arrest by the Jewish leaders. But now my kingdom is from another place."

"You are a king, then!" said Pilate.

Jesus answered, "You say that I am a king. In fact, the reason I was born and came into the world is to testify to the truth. Everyone on the side of truth listens to me."

And so, we come to the end of the church year, Christ the King. One of the things I love about the Church of England is its rhythm and pattern of time. Celebrating the story of Jesus is like a drum beat that takes us from the start of a song to the end. In that drum beat we follow the uncertainty of advent to the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem. In January, we celebrate Jesus' Baptism which marks the beginning of his ministry, marked by the anointing of Jesus, by the Holy Spirit, in the river Jordan. A voice from heaven declares; 'This is my son, with whom I am well pleased.'


In February, the drumbeat takes to Jesus' exhausted footsteps in the Judean wilderness, facing hunger, temptation and uncertainty. We become, at this point embedded in the story, being commanded to follow despite the suffering and uncertainty on our journey of discipleship.

The next part of the drumbeat has us welcoming Christ as King through the gates of Jerusalem, celebrating the culmination of his power as the promised Messiah. Of course, this leads us to disappointment. His Kingship is not as we expected. Sure enough he is crowned, but it is a crown of thorns, his throne is a wooden cross of shame, and his glory the humiliation that he faces suffering the death of a criminal.

The church closes for two nights and a day, and the drum beat falls silent. Slowly the rhythm works back up to a crescendo of life, and Christ rises to life on Easter morning. He is risen, Hallelujah.

Forty beats or days later brings us Christ's ascension, then Christ's ministry is left to us. At Pentecost, we sing the song of the Spirit; 'Come Holy Ghost, our souls inspire,' then, filled with the power of God's presence we recall our own ministry to the World, in the name of Christ.

The All Age Bit

In Rev Eric's message he talks about the Christian year. In the Christian calendar, the year doesn't start in January, but at the beginning of Advent. As next Sunday is the start of Advent, this means that this Sunday is the end of the Christian year. On this Sunday we traditionally celebrate Christ the King. Read the reading on page 2. What kind of King do you think Jesus is? Is he a fierce King? Is he a loving King? Is he a bossy King? A proud King? A greedy King? A forgiving King? Can you think of a time when Jesus wore a crown? Was it a crown made of gold and lots of jewels, or was it a crown made of thorns? When you think of Jesus as King, you think of love and forgiveness, which is what he showed to us by dying for us on the cross. Activities

Poems: Can you write an acrostic poem about Jesus using the letters of the words King (or King of the Jews) as the first letters of each line?

Who am I?: In the reading Pilate asks 'Are you the King of the Jews?'. Play a game of Who am I? Each person writes down the name of a famous person on a sticky note without anyone else seeing. Then they put the sticky note onto someone else's forehead. That person then has to guess who they are by asking questions. The others can only answer 'yes' or 'no'. Take turns asking questions and see who can guess who they are first!

Message from Rev Eric Lomax continued...

The year ends as it began. The last Sunday before Advent, is aptly called; 'Christ the King.' We celebrate the glory of Jesus in Heaven, seated on his throne. The Song ends with powerful major chords, the final beat of the drum, and church is dressed in a rich, royal red.

What we must not miss is the way this timeless song resonates in the reality that we all face. There is little difference between the kingship of Christ portrayed in the last Sunday of the Christian Year, and the Kingship that is portrayed on Good Friday. Jesus the King is embedded in our human experience of life. Throughout the year, whenever we meet, we say the Lord's prayer, and the pivotal line of that prayer is, 'Thy Kingdom Come, your will be done, on Earth as it is in heaven.'

It may be that in our lives we do not see God's Kingship at work. If we experience struggle, uncertainty or pain and suffering, then it is hard to imagine that God is in control, and that Christ is King. The cross, however, shows us that Christ is indeed King at the lowest point of human suffering. His Kingship was, therefore, manifest as Christ cried out his last, on the cross, on Good Friday. Good Friday and Christ the King, therefore, are the parameters that frame our experience of life. In our childhood, in our adulthood, and in our old age; in joy and in sorrow, and in success and failure we call for Jesus to be there for us as our King. At no point do we despair, because it is our prayer, always; 'Your Kingdom, of healing peace and hope, your will for us be done, on earth as it shall be in heaven.' Amen.


