Message from Rev Eric Lomax

Probably one of the most beautiful passages of the Bible. In an ancient, patriarchal society, where women were seen as the subservient possessions of men, Luke the Gospel writer puts two young women at centre stage, as agents of grace; Elizabeth, the mother of John the Baptist, and Mary, the mother of Jesus, both of them were little more than children themselves.

We present one of these girls, Mary, as if we have the impression that she had read the story of her unborn child in advance. Aside from God's uncharacteristic use of angelic voices and heavenly choirs to notify the women, I still find it unconvincing that Mary did not face the same uncertainty of any woman of her time; 'Will either of us survive the pregnancy? What Gender will it be? Will my pregnancy go well? What if there are any problems, or if he struggles to get on with other children?' It is disingenuous to suggest that with the assault on Mary's hormones, that she would not struggle with emotions.

What we have to see is that Mary spoke out with a remarkable and uncompromising faith; 'My soul magnifies the Lord, and my Spirit rejoices in God my Saviour, for he has looked with favour on the lowliness of his handmaid.'

Wow, the word 'lowliness' says it all. The word 'virgin' is just a device to remind us that this birth was the work of God and not of 'man.' The fact is that Mary's sexual status is irrelevant to the fact that God called her. Yes, I have used 'man,' not as a means of gender exclusion, but rather to state what every woman who suffers through the agony of birth, would gladly scream with more colourful language than that recorded of Mary. Man had no part in this, but God still used a woman to go through the agony of childbirth (don't shoot me, as I, as a male, have no knowledge of this. I am simply the messenger!). If Christ is really, as we Christians say, God made flesh, imagine how God, in his infinite love feels, being compressed into the fragility of a human heart. Avoiding a kind of affinity with Roman Catholic Mary-ology, We still have to come to the conclusion that Mary was in solidarity with God in Christ's birth, as she was in Christ's death. Both God and Mary experienced the suffering and death of their beloved son, Jesus. Mary was chosen, according to this great hymn of praise, not because of her virginity, but because of her lowliness.

But Mary's words summarise justice, God's justice. That in a deeply patriarchal society, where women were of little value, God had lifted up the lowly woman, and in the process, brought down the mighty from their seats.

By doing this, he had broken every possible convention of our society, our culture, and even our religions; The poor are fed, and the wealthy go hungry, the blind can see, the powerful are diminished, and while broken are mended, the self satisfied will be diminished.

It is good, just prior to Christmas, to take a glance at Mary and her powerful song, as it strips us of the rather damp 'peace and good will to all people,' message of the Christmas media. It gives us something deeper by reminding us that the Christmas message really does turn our perceptions, our judgements, our prejudices, and indeed, all our existing values upside down. The Christ-child of Christmas undermines the very foundations of our society.

for the Mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is his name.

His mercy is for those who fear him from generation to generation.

He has shown strength with his arm;

he has scattered the proud in the thoughts of their hearts.

He has brought down the powerful from their thrones.

and lifted up the lowly:

he has filled the hungry with good things, and sent the rich away empty.

He has helped his servant Israel,

in remembrance of his mercy,


according to the promise he made to our ancestors, to Abraham and to his descendants for ever.'

The All Age Bit

This week's reading is on page 2, or you may wish to read it from a Children's Bible if you have one. This passage shows the incredibly joyful meeting between Elizabeth (who never thought she would have a baby in her old age) and Mary (who is also pregnant, with God's own Son). People in Nazareth were suspicious of Mary's pregnancy, but Elizabeth encourages Mary that she is blessed and not cursed. Both women rejoice in what God has done. Mary then sings a song of praise which is known as the Magnificat. Elizabeth's baby leaped for joy at Mary's greeting and the presence of Jesus. He knew that the Messiah was there with him!

Activities

Paper chains: lots of people put up paper chains for Christmas. Can you make a paper chain out of strips of paper but before you link the chains together, write a line from the Magnificat on each one. Hang the paper chain up somewhere in your house and think of the joy that Mary and Elizabeth shared each time you see it.

Good news aeroplanes: God has promised to be with us always, just as he was with Mary and Elizabeth. We have so much to give Him thanks for. Write or draw what you are thankful for on pieces of paper and then make the pieces of paper into paper aeroplanes. Fly your aeroplanes and then look at each others to share the good news.
